## A Message from the IFP Secretariat

Dear IFP Alumni, International Partners and Friends,

There have been a lot of exciting developments in the IFP alumni world. As of August 2007, there are now nearly 1,200 IFP alumni—more than double the number that we had this time last year. Seventy-five percent of alumni have returned to their home countries after completion of their studies, with virtually all of the remaining alumni staying abroad for another degree or additional training.

IFP alumni are emerging as highly respected professionals and leaders in their respective fields.

The IFP alumni population includes the first indigenous Brazilian to earn a doctoral degree, a Mozambican who discovered a fatal sheep parasite and the first Ugandan to pursue a PhD in literature, just to name a few. There are myriad examples of this kind of excellence among IFP alumni—far too many to name here.

The legacy of the IFP program will not only be measured in the individual achievements of alumni, but in the long-term impact of country-based IFP alumni networks.

Networks spurred on the dedication of the IFP alumni are emerging in all 22 countries and regions in which IFP operates.

Though each alumni network is concerned with social justice, the focus of each country-based group differs, as group activities are based on the specific needs of that country.

Some examples include:

- Mexican IFP alumni have created a network entitled “The Interdisciplinary Research Network for the Indigenous Peoples of Mexico,” an organization focused on research and development of indigenous issues.
- Vietnamese and Thai alumni networks have been working closely together to foster sustainable Asset-Based Community Development (ABCD) in the rural regions of their respective countries.

There are many more examples like these all across the IFP program.

IFP alumni have found innovative ways to connect and exchange knowledge and experiences with their counterparts both regionally and internationally.

Recently, IFP’s partner organization in Vietnam extended an invitation to a South African alumna to participate in a 3-week ABCD training course at the Coady Institute in Canada and alumni networks have invited alumni guests from other countries to meetings, not only to learn from each other’s experiences, but to continue to strengthen the *international* IFP alumni network.

The IFP alumni newsletter is another way to foster this international exchange. In that same spirit of learning from each other, you will find that some of the articles in this edition of the newsletter have been written by your fellow alumni.

This newsletter is merely a snapshot of some of the activities of the IFP alumni networks—activities that have the potential to change the world.

### Alumna of the Month: *Theodora Mame Nyaneba Jonah, Ghana*

IFP Ghana Alumna Theodora Mame Nyaneba Jonah is a native of Dixcove, a small fishing village in the Western Region, one of the poorest parts of Ghana. However, regardless of her circumstances, Theodora was determined to make a change in her beloved country. Her professional trajectory is spectacular example of an IFP Fellow who remains committed to social justice.

Prior to obtaining her IFP Fellowship, Theodora obtained a Bachelor's degree in Social Work from the University of Ghana, Legon. After graduation, Theodora served as a school Social Worker for the Accra Metropolitan Education Directorate.

In addition to her professional activities, Theodora remained engaged in solving some of the most daunting social challenges in Ghana. Though her work took her to Ghana's capital, Accra, she took it upon herself to organize and conduct free forums to promote the benefits of higher education to youth in her home community. She also provided free accomodation in her own home for youth from her home village who had gained admission to the University of Ghana to help offset some of their education costs.

Theodora won a Ford IFP Fellowship in 2004, and pursued a Masters degree in Social Work from the University of Michigan in the US. During her studies, Theodora also found time to successfully pursue a certificate in *Aging and Special Studies in HIV/AIDS Prevention and Care*.

After graduation, Theodora returned to Ghana where she now serves as School Health Education Programme (SHEP) Coordinator at the Accra Metropolitan Education Directorate. In this role, she is directly responsible for, among other things, HIV/AIDS awareness and Adolescent Reproductive Health for all schools in Accra. She also consults as a Social Work specialist with *Overseas Processing Entity*—a US based organization that works with refugees in Ghana.

Theodora is a member of the IFP Ghana alumni network. Her commitment is a source of inspiration for her fellow Alumni. "I don't know how she does it," says Araba Botchway, Director for IFP Ghana, "she never gets tired or discouraged. She is a true Ghanaian jewel!"

Despite her busy schedule, Theodora still finds ways to stay connected to her home community. Whenever possible, she returns to conduct community outreach workshops on higher education. And yes, she still hosts university students free of charge in her home. She currently accommodates thirteen University of Ghana students!

Eventually, Theodora hopes to establish an NGO at Dixcove to promote higher education and train adolescent girls who drop out of school due to teenage pregnancy. "I have always had many goals," says Theodora. "The IFP Fellowship has given me the platform from which to change conditions in Ghana. It is a responsibility—no, an obligation—that I take very, very seriously."

### **In Memoriam: Mary Fatima Taidi-Abu (1977-2007)**

Mary Fatima Taidi joined Pathfinder International family in October 2004. Until her death, she occupied the position of Assistant Project Officer for the Ford Foundation International Fellowships Program. She was a multi-talented, outspoken but respectful, woman who was passionate about her work and vision. She worked diligently and was actually on duty the whole of the Friday before the day of her death.

We were blessed to have Mary as a member of our staff. She was committed to the advancement of Pathfinder's values and mission. She was friendly and reached out to all staff, helping them to improve their work by providing counseling in times of trouble. She made staff meetings lively and contributed tremendously to the quality of the meetings. She was much loved by her colleagues, so much so that her wedding was attended by virtually everybody in the Pathfinder organization. She made it a point to thank everyone individually.

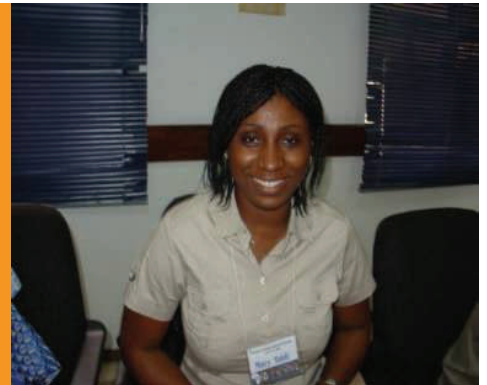
Mary Taidi was a very strong advocate for women. She had an unwavering vision that women would eventually assume the highest positions of leadership in Nigeria (and indeed Africa) and was committed to achieving that, both personally and professionally. It is of little wonder then, that she won the prestigious Association of American University Women Scholarship to successfully pursue a Master's degree at Brandeis University in the United States.

The impact that Mary made on the the IFP Fellows and Alumni is best appreciated by reading the many responses received within less than twenty-four hours following the news of her untimely passing. ### Fulfilling Promises—IFP Thai Alumni Meet and Recommit Themselves to Social Justice

On April 21-22, 2007, IFP Thailand Alumni held an historic meeting in Khon Kaen, Thailand. The meeting began unofficially with alumni eagerly catching up on each other's lives and swapping stories about their current development projects.

Dr. Lourdes G. Salvador, Executive Director of the Asian Scholarship Fund, IFP's International Partner in Thailand, officially opened the meeting by asking the alumni to share stories about their studies abroad. Dr. Salvador reminded the alumni that though the completion of their studies was a great achievement, their promise never to turn away from their local commitments was of even greater importance. Mr. Jaruwat Kiatiwongse, IFP Program Officer-Thailand, then followed with the IFP Global Overview, informing the attendees about alumni happenings in other IFP countries.

The rich agenda included presentations on topics such as *Leadership and its Role in Making a Difference in the Communities in Isaan* (one of the poorest parts of Thailand), *Addressing Development Needs in Isaan: Collaboration Between NGO's and Academia—A New Phase in the IFP-Leadership for Social Justice Forum*. Dr. Banchon Kaewsong, Advisor to the Coordinating Committee on Rural Development (NGO-CORD) in Northeast Thailand, challenged the alumni to not only about think about their own leadership abilities but their future role as local change makers. One of the highlights of the presentation portion of the agenda was an inspirational talk by Dr. Juree Vchit Vadakan, Chair of the Advisory Committee of IFP. Dr. Vadakan urged the Thai alumni to use the experience that IFP has given them as a motivation force for social change.

Thai IFP alumni were also treated to a presentation by Ms. Minh Kauffman, Director of the Center for Educational Exchange (CEEVN) in Vietnam, IFP's International Partner in Vietnam. Ms. Kaufmann presented *The ABCD Approach: "Asset-Based Community Development,"* an innovative, community-driven development model.

After the presentations, alumni reflected on what they had learned, and brainstormed ways on how apply this knowledge to IFP Thailand Alumni Network activities. Many alumni expressed increased interest in working with small-scale farmers in poor, rural communities who struggle with issues of sustainable agricultural development, and self-reliance.

At the conclusion of the meeting, the motivated alumni created an ambitious plan of action for moving forward. With this plan in place, the alumni meeting closed with kind words for the staff of the Asian Scholarship Foundation Staff, the Center for Educational Exchange with Vietnam (CEEVN), and profound appreciation for the Ford Foundation International Fellowships Program, with the sentiment that the "IFP has given us some of the best things that we will cherish in our lifetime."

### NEWS FROM IFP VIETNAM ALUMNI: IFP VIETNAM ALUMNI PROJECT SKILLS WORKSHOP

From April 30<sup>th</sup>- May 4<sup>th</sup> 2007, eighteen IFP Vietnam Alumni met for a training workshop on *Project Skills: Proposal Writing*. The Vietnamese staff members of World Vision International, an international NGO currently working in Vietnam, served as the primary trainers for the workshop. The training took place at Da Lat University, Lam Dong Province—the same institution where alumnus Huynh Thi Ngoc Phuong (2004) currently serves as a professor.

The workshop provided the IFP Vietnam Alumni an opportunity to refresh and expand their knowledge and skills in Project Management and Project Writing.

Throughout the workshop, the alumni prepared drafts of the two projects that they had long intended to do: (1) developing a strong and professional IFP Vietnam Alumni Network and (2) establishing procedures to operationalize the “Water Lilies Fund”—a fund to support selected disadvantaged students in Vietnam who face the danger of dropping out of school.

The IFP Vietnam alumni also invited 10 undergraduate students from Da Lat University to participate in the workshop and contribute their ideas to the formation of the Water Lilies Fund. Not only was this instructive for the 10 students, it provided the alumni with an opportunity to stay connected to committed youth in Vietnam. Additionally, the alumni found the workshop very useful in providing the necessary knowledge and skills needed to write successful proposals. Overall, the alumni felt that the meeting helped them to reinforce the collective power of the Vietnam Alumni Network

As a result of the overwhelming success of the meeting, IFP Vietnam alumni are currently in the process of completing two proposal drafts, one for alumni network development and another proposal seeking funding for the Water Lilies Fund initiative.

### ***New and Important Voices being Heard: IFP Brazil Alumni Launch the First of a Four-Volume Research Compilation***

*Education*, the first publication in the four-volume *Justice and Development* collection, was launched in São Paulo, Brazil on May 31<sup>st</sup>. This four-volume series is intended to disseminate research done by IFP Alumni of Brazil to the larger academic and policy-making community.

For the Carlos Chagas Foundation (FCC), the International Partner for the IFP Program in Brazil, organization and publication of academic texts is an essential component of regular program activity. The creation of this volume represents a kind of “complementary training” for the IFP alumni, a critical professional development element that is often overlooked in graduate programs. By initiating an extensive discussion about the authorship of academic articles, IFP Brazil alumni, including collection organizers Luiz Alberto Oliveira Gonçalves and Regina Pahim Pinto, were essential in fostering the intellectual formation of the newest wave of emerging researchers in Brazil.

This series of published collections has the potential not only to reinforce ties between fellows and alumni but to provide them with an increased level of public visibility by offering bibliographical abstracts and cutting-edge scholarship to researchers and activists in training and action.

In total, *Education*, written in Portuguese, boasts eleven authors, writing on topics that vary from the effectiveness of computers in language learning, to rap as a transformative and confrontational experience for disenfranchised youth. These articles clearly bear the mark of their authors, for whom the choice of a subject has long been a research interest and now, an area of expertise.

*Education*, written by social activists who hail from marginalized communities themselves, is ground-breaking in that respect. By providing a rigorous, intellectual forum for these scholars to present their research, *Education* is a clarion call that the promise of the IFP program is certainly being realized in Brazil.

### IFP China Alumnus Makes a Big Impression at Columbia University

In May, one of our newest alumni, Zhiyong Chen of China graduated from Columbia University Teacher's College (TC) with a Masters degree in Curriculum and Teaching. His accomplishment was made even more special as the President of Teachers College, Columbia University, Dr. Susan Fuhrman, during her convocation speech, shared Chen's story as an example of perseverance and excellence. Chen was one of only two students mentioned *directly*. An excerpt from Dr. Fuhrman's convocation speech follows:

*"...Our graduates' personal stories – the simple facts of why they came to Teachers College, what they have done here, and where they are going next – are an amazing testimony to their desire to make a positive impact in the world. I'd like to share two of those stories with you right now. Zhiyong Chen, who is receiving his master's degree from the department off Curriculum and Teaching, grew up in a small village in China's Sichuan province. A passionate and gifted student, in 1987 he was hospitalized with a kidney ailment so severe it prevented him from working for five years. In 2004, it also forced him to put off coming to the U.S. and Teachers College under a program sponsored by the Ford Foundation. Zhiyong finally made it here with wife and young daughter in 2005, but continued to struggle with his health and ultimately underwent surgery. He also found that his English, which he'd learned as a 14-year-old high school student, was more than a tad rusty. Somehow, Zhiyong went on to post an A or A plus in every course he took at TC save one. Just as impressively, he missed only one class, and that because he was away attending an international conference. Zhiyong and his family will return in June to China, where he will work with American students who visit China through the U.S. State Department. Best of luck, Zhiyong – our hats are off to you today...."*

#### ***Mozambique has its Second Alumni Meeting***

Mozambique held its second alumni meeting on August 11-12, 2007 in Maputo, Mozambique. The meeting boasted 24 participants including IFP Director for Mozambique, Célia Diniz and IFP Program Officer, Tricia Callender. Armed with a renewed sense of commitment and good wishes from their Brazilian colleagues, the IFP Mozambique alumni network got straight to work.

Alumni decided that re-entry issues were the biggest obstacle for IFP Mozambican alumni, and without a support mechanism for newly returning alumni, the network might not realize its true potential. Therefore, alumni are focusing on the creation of a “resume bank” to assist them in finding jobs when they return home.

In addition, IFP alumni pledged to concentrate their efforts in the rural areas of Mozambique. Alumni then broke into “task force” groups to decide exactly which activities would be the focus of the IFP Mozambique Alumni Network. The meeting ended with each “task force” assigned to create detailed plans for alumni activities in some of the most impoverished areas of Mozambique. IFP Alumni expressed interest in working more closely with their Brazilian and South African colleagues to foster stronger regional and international linkages.
